

Music Thanatology: Music as Medicine at the End of Life

Margaret Pasquesi is a music thanatologist and founder of the music thanatology program at Journeycare in Chicago. In this subspecialty of palliative care, practitioners use harps to calm patients in their final hours, countering normal feelings of fear and anxiety that come with dying. Pasquesi says, "We use music to address the physical manifestations of the dying process... Our main job is to accompany someone through the dying process, and we tailor the music to what is going on physically for the patient."
